Ozempic[®] Drug Shortage Information for Patients

Worldwide Shortage of Ozempic[®]. Supply Intermittent until March 31, 2024.

The Saskatchewan Ministry of Health is aware of the Ozempic[®] shortage. We recognize the importance of Ozempic[®] for patients living with type 2 diabetes.

The ministry is working with partners to support patients and health-care providers. These partners include drug manufacturers, Health Canada, the provincial Drug Advisory Committee of Saskatchewan, and health-care providers.

Frequently Asked Questions

What is Ozempic[®]?

Ozempic[®] contains semaglutide, a medication used to treat diabetes. It is a once-a-week injectable medication that is different from insulin. It is from a class of medication called a GLP1 receptor agonist.

Is Ozempic[®] a listed Saskatchewan Drug Plan benefit?

Ozempic[®] may be a benefit under the Saskatchewan Drug Plan for eligible patients with type 2 diabetes who meet the Exception Drug Status (EDS) criteria. Ozempic[®] is not officially approved by Health Canada for weight management.

Why is Ozempic[®] not available?

Novo Nordisk, the drug company that makes and sells Ozempic[®] in Canada, says the shortage is caused by overall global supply constraints and increased demand for the drug.

How long will the shortage last?

The manufacturer expects that the supply of Ozempic[®] will be intermittent until March 2024.

What strengths of Ozempic[®] are affected by the shortage?

• All pen strengths of Ozempic[®] are expected to be affected by this shortage.

What can I do?

- Patients are encouraged to contact their pharmacy well in advance of running out of their current supply.
- Explore different treatment options that may be appropriate for you with your pharmacist and/or prescriber.

Are other treatment options for type 2 diabetes covered by the Drug Plan? How much do they cost?

- The Saskatchewan Formulary lists many medications used to treat diabetes.
 - To be a Drug Plan benefit, some of these drugs require approval under Exception Drug Status (EDS) criteria.
 - o Cost will vary based on the patient's usual medication deductible and/or co-payment.

What can my pharmacist do?

- To preserve supply, Novo Nordisk is advising pharmacies to limit refill prescriptions to monthly renewals.
- Your pharmacist and health-care provider can explore different treatment options that may be appropriate for you.
